The War Memorial Oak



The first known memorial tree to be planted to acknowledge the beginning of hostilities in Europe, by an allied nation, anywhere in the world, is the English Oak planted in Creswell Gardens, Adelaide, South Australia on the 29th of August 1914, a mere 25 days after the declaration of war between the United Kingdom and Germany.

It was to be another 8 months before Australia's enlisted sailed off to Gallipoli. This Oak was planted by Sir Henry Galway, then Governor of South Australia.

Since 2009 TREENET has been collecting acorns from the War Memorial Oak to produce offspring of this oldest WW1 memorial tree, for planting in new or restored Avenues of Honour.

The first of these was planted on 11th November 2012 at Malvern Uniting Church, City of Unley, Adelaide.

A second pedigree Oak - known as the Centenary War Memorial Oak, was planted on the 29th August 2014 within the Cresswell Gardens.
